

**GILES BEAUCHAMP, having  
been duly SWORN, states:**

**MR. JOHNSTON:**

**EXAMINATION-IN-CHIEF:**

- Q. You said your name was Giles Beauchamp? 3
- A. Yes. 4
- Q. What is your date of birth, please. 5
- A. May 24, 1960. 6
- Q. So on April 4, 1969, you were 8, and just a little short of 9? 7
- A. Yes. 8
- Q. I understand that day you made a discovery, Mr. Beauchamp, that brings you to court this morning. I wonder if you'd tell the Members of the Jury where you were living back then, sir? 9
- A. I lived at 1505 - 20th Street West. 10
- Q. 1505 - 20th Street West? 11
- A. Yes. 12
- Q. In Saskatoon, Saskatchewan? 13
- A. Yes. 14
- Q. Who did you live there with? 15
- A. My parents, family. 16
- Q. Okay. I understand on April 4, 1969 you made a discovery. Would you tell the Jury what time of day it was and how you came to make this discovery, please. 17
- A. Time of day? It was probably a little later in the day. I was walking along Avenue O and I was kicking the snow, and I kicked a wallet out from the snow bank, and that's where it all began. 18
- Q. What did you do with the wallet? 19

- A. From there I picked it up, looked through it, was heading home so I put it underneath the shack at St. Mary's School. 1  
2
- Q. Was there any money in it, Mr. Beauchamp? 3
- A. No, there wasn't. 4
- Q. Did you see what was in it at that moment? 5
- A. At that moment, no. I just noticed that there were just papers. 6
- Q. Okay. So you said you took it and put it where? 7
- A. Underneath the rink shack at St. Mary's School. 8
- Q. That's an outdoor skating rink? 9
- A. Yes. 10
- Q. And the shack, that used to exist in those locations, you put it underneath the shack and went home? 11  
12
- A. Yes. 13
- Q. What happened to that wallet then, as far as you know? 14
- A. Well, it stayed there. I went from -- went home, had supper. From there I went back, picked up the wallet, and went over to a friend's place. And I showed him and we decided, well we'd better show his mom and see what she wanted to do with it, and she noticed that it was Gail Miller's wallet, and from there she phoned the police. 15

- Q. So, your friend's mom. Who is your friend's mom? 20
- A. Norman Remanda (ph). 21
- Q. Phoned the police? 22
- A. Yeah. 23
- Q. And did the police come out? 24
- A. Yes, they did. 25
- Q. And did you speak to them yourself, Mr. Beauchamp? 26

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- A. Yes. 1
- Q. Did you lead them to the wallet, or did you give them the wallet? 2
- A. Well, I think Norman's mom gave them the wallet. 3
- Q. I'm sorry, maybe just let me back up. This is my fault, Mr. 4  
Beauchamp. You said you had put the wallet under the shack? 5
- A. Right. 6
- Q. And then you had gone over to your friend's place and you got talking 7  
about it, or did you take the wallet over to your friend's place? 8
- A. I took the wallet over there. 9
- Q. My misunderstanding. I'm sorry. And then his mom looked through it 10  
and realized the significance of it, and called the police? 11
- A. Right. 12
- Q. So the police come out. Did you give them the wallet, Mr. 13  
Beauchamp? 14
- A. Mhmm. 15
- Q. Did you take them to where you had found it? 16
- A. Yes. 17
- Q. Do you know whether or not they or you found anything else at that 18  
location? 19
- A. Yeah, we had searched around and we had found one other piece that 20  
had fallen out of the wallet. 21
- Q. Do you know what it was? 22
- A. No, I don't. 23
- Q. Okay. I wonder, Mr. Beauchamp, and I'm not just sure -- I'll check in 24  
a moment, maybe I'll get you to use this large diagram in any case. 25  
Would you mind, Mr. Beauchamp, coming down off the stand. 26

MR. JOHNSTON: This is exhibit P-2, My Lord, for the record. 1

THE COURT: Thank you. 2

EXAMINATION-IN-CHIEF OF GILES BEAUCHAMP (CONTINUES): 3

Q. If you don't mind, just stand over to that side so the Members of the 4  
Jury can see it, Mr. Beauchamp. We've been told this is a map of a 5  
particular area of Saskatoon with the large black lines representing 6  
22nd Street running east and west, two blocks down is 20th Street, 7  
and we've been told the vertical line that I'm referring to here is 8  
Avenue O. Does that look at all familiar to you, Mr. Beauchamp? 9

A. Yeah. 10

Q. Do you know, for example, where St. Mary's Church was and St. 11  
Mary's School? 12

A. Yes. 13

Q. Where were you living in relation to St. Mary's School back then? 14

A. To St. Mary's School? 15

Q. Yes. 16

A. We would have been right here. 17

Q. I'm sorry, what was your address again? 18

A. 1505 - 20th Street West. 19

Q. 1505 - 20th Street West. So the front of your house would be facing 20  
20th Street and your back yard would be in the direction of St. Mary's 21  
School? 22

A. Yes. 23

Q. Did you back right on to St. Mary's School yard? 24

A. Across the alley, yes -- 25

Q. Across the alley. 26

- A. ... was the school yard. 1
- Q. I wonder if, using this diagram and my pen, the blunt end of it not the 2  
other end, if you can just point, so that the Members of the Jury can 3  
see, approximately where it was that you found that wallet. 4
- A. It would have been probably around here. 5
- Q. You're pointing to the area of Avenue O in front of the 330 square? 6
- A. Yeah. 7
- Q. Do you remember what side of the street? 8
- A. The east side. 9
- Q. The east side of the street? 10
- A. Yeah. 11
- Q. That would be the side of the street nearest to 330? 12
- A. Yeah, on this side. Yeah. 13
- Q. And where in terms of street, sidewalk, anything like that? 14
- A. Okay. If you have the sidewalk here where everybody built up the 15  
snow before the street, it would have been right in there. 16
- Q. Between the sidewalk and the street, or the sidewalk and the yard? 17
- A. Between the sidewalk and the street. 18
- Q. And the street? 19
- A. Yes. 20
- Q. And you said you were just kicking snow and kicked it out? 21
- A. Yeah. 22
- Q. Had you seen it before you kicked it? 23
- A. No. 24
- Q. Now, you mentioned you live on 20th Street. Do you know who lived 25  
in any of those other places? For example, do you know who lived at 26

334, Mr. Beauchamp?	1
A. That's the corner house. That would have been Cadrain's house.	2
Q. Cadrain's house?	3
A. Yes.	4
Q. Did you know any of the people who lived there?	5
A. Yeah. I knew a member of the family.	6
Q. Who did you know that lived there?	7
A. That I used to play with would have been Phillip probably.	8
Q. Phillip?	9
A. Yeah.	10
Q. So Phillip Cadrain was a fellow roughly your age?	11
A. Yes.	12
Q. You used to play with him?	13
A. Mhmm.	14
Q. Did you ever go over to their place?	15
A. Oh, yes.	16
Q. Do you know who lived there? Or, who all lived there that you know of?	17 18
A. As far as I knew it was just the Cadraings.	19
Q. The Cadraings?	20
A. Yes.	21
Q. What part of that house were you ever in, Giles?	22
A. The upstairs.	23
Q. The upstairs?	24
A. Yeah.	25
Q. Do you know anything of the downstairs?	26

- A. No. 1
- Q. Okay. How far away from the Cadrain house was it that the wallet  
was discovered? 2  
3
- A. Again I'm thinking about three houses down. Three. 4
- MR. JOHNSTON: Thank you. You can go back there now. 5  
Oh, I'm sorry, before you do, Giles, I wonder, with the permission of 6  
the Court, if I could have Mr. Beauchamp just mark his initial in the 7  
area where he located the wallet, My Lord. 8
- THE COURT: Yes. 9
- EXAMINATION-IN-CHIEF OF GILES BEAUCHAMP (CONTINUES): 10
- Q. Would you mind doing that, Giles. 11
- A. Just right on here? 12
- Q. Yes. Now, you've marked your initials, Giles, on exhibit P-2, I'm  
saying this for the record, at the 330 rectangle, right? 13  
14
- A. Yes. 15
- Q. You marked and initialled on what I would call the northwest corner of  
that. I just want to say, did you find the wallet near the northwest  
corner, or do you know? 16  
17  
18
- A. No. I can't be sure of that. 19
- Q. No. I didn't mean to impute that you did. I just wanted to clarify. We  
have to do this for the record, Mr. Beauchamp. 20  
21
- A. Yeah. 22
- Q. You pointed to somewhere in front of 330? 23
- A. Yes. 24
- Q. Okay. So you turned over to the police, as far as you know, the  
wallet and contents, Mr. Beauchamp? 25  
26

A. Yes. 1

Q. And anything else? 2

A. There was nothing else. 3

Q. Okay. And the police retrieved the items that you found later when  
you took them back to the location where you found the wallet? 4

A. Yes. 5

MR. JOHNSTON: Okay. I have no further questions, Mr. 6  
Beauchamp. If you would answer Mr. Beresh's questions, please. 7

THE COURT: Thank you. Mr. Beresh, please. 8

**MR. BERESH:** **CROSS-EXAMINATION OF GILES BEAUCHAMP:** 9

Q. Despite the fact that you were only 8 going on 9, you remember this 10  
event very well? 11

A. Yeah. I seem to, yeah. 12

Q. Obviously it was a big event (inaudible - not near microphone) news, 13  
that sort of thing? 14

A. Mhmm. 15

Q. So, you have clear recollection because of that, despite your age? 16

A. Yes. 17

Q. Okay. Sir, I want to ask you about the Cadrain house. Obviously 18  
you'd go there and play with your school chums? 19

A. Yes. 20

Q. The father's name of the family, was it -- do you remember the name? 21

A. No, I don't. 22

Q. Estelle was the mom? 23

A. Again, I don't know. 24

- Q. Fair enough. There was Ken Cadrain, I understand? 1
- A. Yes. 2
- Q. He was a young guy as well? 3
- A. Yes. 4
- Q. Celine, I think was her name? 5
- A. I don't remember the daughter's name. 6
- Q. But there was a daughter? 7
- A. I think there was, yeah. 8
- Q. Fair enough. There was somebody by the name of Albert, do you remember Albert? 9  
10
- A. Yes. 11
- Q. He had a nickname Shorty? 12
- A. Right. 13
- Q. Was that because he was short? 14
- A. Offhand, don't know. 15
- Q. Fair enough. But he lived at the house, too? 16
- A. Right. 17
- Q. Albert Shorty Cadrain. 18
- A. Yeah. 19
- Q. Okay. And so you would go to St. Mary's School every day that school was in? 20  
21
- A. Yes. 22
- Q. And obviously you would walk from your house? 23
- A. Yes. 24
- Q. Do you remember where, in 1969 around the time we're talking about, where the bus stop was located? 25  
26

- A. At the corner of Avenue O and 20th. 1
- Q. Okay. And where was the next one, if you went to that location and  
you looked toward downtown, which was east, where would the next  
one be, how far away? 2  
3  
4
- A. I imagine every block. 5
- Q. Just a block away? 6
- A. I think so. 7
- Q. So if, for example, I didn't want to catch the bus at O and 20th, I  
could walk to N and 20th and catch it there? 8  
9
- A. I think so. 10
- Q. Or, to M and 20th, and so on. And I take it the other way as well? 11
- A. Yes. 12
- Q. If I didn't want to be -- catch the bus at a certain location I'd just have  
to walk a block? 13  
14
- A. Yes. 15
- Q. Just one last area, please. You said it was -- I heard you say three  
houses north of Cadrain's? 16  
17
- A. Approximately, yeah. 18
- Q. Okay. My numbering suggests that after 334 there would be 332,  
correct? 19  
20
- A. Yeah. 21
- Q. Then 330. 22
- A. Okay. 23
- Q. Then 328. I think that's the numbering system if you look at the --  
this is a different area, it seems to be that, multiples of two, 26, 24,  
22. 24  
25  
26

A. Mhmm. 1

Q. Correct. So you -- are you saying it was somewhere around 328 that  
you found it? 2  
3

A. Very possible, yes. 4

Q. This was an area where lots of people lived? 5

A. Yes. 6

Q. You didn't take a census obviously, but from impressions it looked like  
every house had people living in it? 7  
8

A. Yes. 9

Q. Okay. That morning, sir -- this, by the way, was sometime in the  
spring, was it? 10  
11

A. Yes. April 4. 12

Q. April 4? 13

A. Yeah. 14

Q. Okay. April 4? 15

A. Yes. 16

MR. BERESH: Okay. Thank you very much, sir. 17

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Beresh. Any re- 18  
examination? 19

MR. JOHNSTON: No, My Lord. 20

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Beauchamp. You're 21  
excused. 22

MR. JOHNSTON: Thanks a lot, Giles. The next witness is 23  
Joe Penkala, My Lord. 24

THE COURT: Yes. 25
